School Mission:

Citizenship & Science Academy of Syracuse Charter School will provide support, challenges and opportunities for its students, and it will instill the necessary skills and knowledge in math, science, and technology to empower students, through high intellectual standards, preparing them for college, career, and citizenship.

Key Design Elements:

College Preparation:

Aligned in every way with the school's mission to graduate college-ready and civic-minded students, the importance of college readiness is understood very well at CSASCS. In addition to high-quality instruction and curriculum, programs during school, after school, and during the summer have been developed and practiced to ensure every student can attend college. At the K-5 level, Saturday Scholars STEM and Summer Scholars are examples of two programs where students are provided additional academic support and enrichment. Students in grade 7 took a field trip to SUNY Oswego, where they were exposed to the college environment and visited historical places they had learned about in their social studies class. Students participate in "superintendent's lunch," where they get to ask questions about the school's mission and vision to be informed about the college experience.

- *ENL students and other selected students went on a SUNY ESF field trip to learn more about the college and what it can offer our students.
- *The SUNY OCC president visited our school to discuss the success story and gave a speech.
- *The On Point president met with our students online and discussed their plans to go to college, how On Point for College can help students purchase books, and the On Point institution's willingness to take our students on college tours to increase awareness.

Focused on STEM and Environment:

CSASCS promotes real-world problem solving & exploration in science and mathematics, interactive engagement and collaborative problem-solving opportunities, field trips to environmentally friendly locations and science museums, and regular use of technology: smartboard, IPAD one-on-one Chromebooks, internet, and apps.

Students participate in local competitions: CNY Bridge Building, Steamboat Challenges, and Robotics Challenge. At the K-5 level, STEAM was added as a once-a-week special for all students during the 22-23 school year and continued through the 23-24 school year. During STEAM, students participate in various hands-on, minds-on activities, including coding, Lego challenges, science experiments, etc. Additionally, our Saturday Scholars STEM Enrichment/ Remediation program allows scholars to partake in weekly STEM-based challenges (i.e., making slime,

creating a safe capsule for an egg drop, etc.). At the 6-7 level, scholars are scheduled to be in STEAM classes every other day, where they learn about programming (Tynker) and other enrichment activities. Students in 6&8 grades also participated in STEM Challenges organized by the MOST Museum of Science. Our scholars also participated in the Micron Robotics Challenge for the first time. One of our students has initiated collecting recycled bottles to ensure they are not environmentally harmful. Our students began a garden where they grow certain vegetables/herbs, and students and staff can take them home when they grow.

Glocal Education:

CSASCS has a celebratory atmosphere and promotes positive attitudes through quarterly recognition and rewards for academic efforts and citizenship evidence through certificates, gift certificates, and classroom celebrations. Students are encouraged to share cultural backgrounds, and teachers incorporate these backgrounds through culturally responsive teaching lessons. As students participate in community service opportunities, they become aware of the issues facing their region, and by becoming an active part of the solution, they become more involved, caring citizens. By recognizing challenges and taking part in solving them, students become better problem solvers and gain real-life application experience. As part of the Commitment Letter signed by each student and his or her guardian, each student must complete 225 hours of community service as a graduation requirement through K-12. The total volunteer hour requirement for graduation will be pro-rated based on the grade level that each student enters the school. All community services will be tracked digitally on an ongoing basis as a method to celebrate student efforts. At the K-5 level, students are provided various in-house service opportunities, including a canned food drive (donating and helping to organize the event), library assistants, buddy room helpers, creating welcome cards for refugee families, etc.

Additionally, a Service Committee was formed in the spring of this year. This committee meets monthly and is working to create monthly service opportunities for staff, students, and families for the 23-24 school year. In middle school, students are recognized for the monthly characters that they display. Students also have many opportunities to fulfill their community service hours, including but not limited to cleaning the cafeteria, helping teachers organize their classrooms, and volunteering in an animal shelter.

Professional development is provided to staff in conjunction with specific ENL support services provided by a licensed ENL teacher. The ENL instructional model is emphasized based on adjusting the presentation of materials, extensive modeling demonstration, and individualized directions. Beyond this, students inquire in groups where lessons are scaffolded using learning materials, tasks, and adjusted groupings. Students then show what they know orally or in writing using the language output method, which is then monitored for progress toward learning goals.

Scholars work on their Science Fair projects with the guidance of their Science, STEAM, and ELA teachers. They must develop a hypothesis, conduct experiments to test the possible solution, and present it to the judges. During

this process, they learn to be part of the solution and increase their social interaction skills.

*Our teachers have been trained in CPR, where they can intervene to save a life in an emergency.

Student-Centered School Structure:

CSASCS schools offer a small, safe, nurturing environment to their students. The school has an academic leader called the dean of the school and a dean of students who deals with daily student support issues. By creating a small school environment at its location, CSASCS establishes a family atmosphere in which all staff members know each other and students and can provide a safer and more controlled environment. Each K-2 classroom has two teachers to provide academic and emotional support. This reduces staff to student ratio to 12:1, optimizing ongoing support. Both parent and staff surveys showed that they find the school's small environment and individual attention extremely valuable and safe. In the K-5 building, ten support staff aid students in reading or math. These teachers push into classrooms to support Tier I instruction or pull students into a smaller Tier II group depending on the student's needs. The middle school has support staff for Math and ELA who pull out students to help with the interventions. At the middle school level, math teachers use TEDSolutions to assign standard-based quizzes to assess students and help them with interventions. Every student might need a different standard to work on, and there is an intervention period to have scholars work with the teacher's guidance. Also, advisory (~10 minutes) allows students and teachers to emphasize the SEL, such as monthly characters and positivity projects (especially in grade 6).

*Students contributed to the Hispanic Heritage Celebration, Black History Month Celebration, Multicultural Night and Talent Show, and the school dance.

Parental Involvement and Home Visits:

Students' success and performance are affected not only by teachers but also by their parents and environment. Therefore, parental involvement is a significant part of our school's strategic goals. The school's teachers perform home visits to understand the students' challenges and abilities and to create a better triad of parent-student-teacher relationships. During home visits, teachers encourage parents to actively participate in students' learning at home. Parents also volunteer regularly in classrooms as guest readers, field trip chaperones, and academic support during projects and hands-on learning tasks. At the K-5 level, a Music Boosters club was formed this year -helping bring families passionate about music together with school teachers. At the middle school level, we meet with parents monthly for "parent coffee talk" to get their feedback and inform them about the events that take place in the school. We also involve our counselor to meet with parents. The counselor goes over specific presentations so the parents can help their scholars. At the middle school level, we conduct monthly parent coffee talks to collect feedback from the parents and present them with different topics to ensure their voices are heard. Our teachers are required to conduct home visits.

Performance-based accountability:

The school must achieve academic and organizational excellence through outstanding instructional quality coupled with the school's key design elements to remain a viable educational alternative in the community. Student performance, teaching, and learning are measured monthly and/or quarterly through data collected and tracked by multiple assessment instruments, including STAR Math and Reading Testing, iReady testing, full-length practice tests for state Assessments, and Fountas and Pinell running records. Student performance is documented and reviewed by teachers and school administrators. Based on these performance results, teachers create intervention plans to improve individual student achievement.

Teachers meet monthly with coaches, intervention coordinators, and school administration to review student data. This data is used to create intervention plans for students, emphasizing individual goals in math and reading for each student. These goals are growth-based, and annual checkpoints are set up as a means of progress monitoring. In monthly data meetings, progress is reviewed, and specific academic intervention plans are adjusted regularly to maximize student growth. There is an extensive teacher observation and enrichment program in which every teacher is visited periodically and given feedback, with resources tailored to their individual needs using NYSED-approved models, such as the Danielson Framework for teacher evaluation and the Frontline Education program. CSASCS has several instructional coaches, peer mentors, and administrators who perform class observations and provide feedback to improve instruction. Each teacher has an individualized improvement plan based on compiled data, allowing teachers to focus on specific domains and performance indicators of the Danielson Framework.



A. TEACH System - Employee Clearance

Charter schools must ensure that all prospective employees[1] receive clearance through the NYSED Office of School Personnel Review and Accountability (OSPRA) prior to employment. B. Emergency Conditional Clearances

Charter schools are **strongly discouraged** from using the emergency conditional clearance provisions for prospective employees. This is because the school must request clearance through NYSED TEACH, and the school's emergency conditional clearance of the employee terminates <u>automatically</u> once the school receives notification from NYSED regarding the clearance request. Status notification is provided for all prospective employees through the NYSED TEACH portal within 48 hours after the clearance request is submitted. Therefore, at most, a school's emergency conditional clearance will be valid for only 48 hours after approval by the board.

Schools are not permitted to renew or in any way re-establish a prospective employee's emergency conditional clearance after status notification is sent by NYSED through the TEACH portal.







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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Trustees Science Academies of New York Charter Schools Syracuse, New York

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools (a New York State nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2024, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools as of June 30, 2024, and the changes in net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Science Academies of New York Charter Schools' ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not absolute assurance and therefore, is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements, including omissions, are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards*, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
 procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an
 opinion on the effectiveness of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools' internal
 control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Science Academies of New York Charter Schools' ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

Report on Summarized Comparative Information

We have previously audited Science Academies of New York Charter Schools' 2023 financial statements, and we expressed an unmodified audit opinion on those audited financial statements in our report dated October 30, 2023. In our opinion, the summarized comparative information presented herein, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2023 is consistent, in all material respects, with the audited financial statements from which it has been derived.

Report on Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards, as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated October 28, 2024 on our consideration of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools' internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools' internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Science Academies of New York Charter Schools's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization

Science Academies of New York Charter Schools (the School) is a not-for-profit education corporation that operates four public charter schools. Syracuse Academy of Science Charter School maintains grades K-12 in Syracuse, NY. Utica Academy of Science Charter School maintains grades K-12 in Utica, NY. Citizenship and Science Academy of Syracuse Charter School maintains grades K-8 and plans to expand to grade 12 by 2027. Citizenship and Science Academy of Rochester Charter School maintains grades K-3 and plans to expand to grade 6 by 2027. All four charters place a special emphasis on math, science, and technology. The School seeks to empower students through high intellectual standards and prepare them for college, career, and citizenship. The School obtains its revenue mainly from charter school basic tuition from the Syracuse City School District, Utica City School District, Rochester City School District, and a few other surrounding school districts, in addition to food service, and state and federal grants.

The main programs of the School are as follows:

REGULAR EDUCATION: The School's curriculum is focused on mathematics, science, and technology. The School seeks to graduate students who can think critically and creatively who are committed to a lifetime of learning and civic involvement, and who are conscious of local, global, and environmental issues. All courses align with the New York State Learning Standards.

SPECIAL EDUCATION: The School is open to all children and does not discriminate on the basis of ethnicity, national origin, gender, disability, or any other grounds that would be unlawful or deny the civil rights of any individual. In accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the Rehabilitation Act, Section 504, and the Americans with Disabilities Act, the School provides a free and appropriate education, in the least restrictive environment to students with disabilities. The primary service delivery for students with special needs is inclusion. Services for students requiring supplemental services are provided by the Syracuse, Utica, and Rochester City School Districts.

OTHER PROGRAMS: Other programs include food services, athletics, and extra-curricular activities.

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

Net Assets

In accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the School reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to the existence or absence of donor or grantor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions – Net assets available for use in general operations and not subject to donor (or certain grantor) restrictions. The board did designate funds. See Note 8 for more information.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions – Net assets subject to donor (or certain grantor) imposed restrictions. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both.

Contributions restricted by donors are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restrictions expire (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished) in the reporting period in which the revenue is recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions, based on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statements of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

There were no net assets with donor restrictions at June 30, 2024 and 2023.

NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Accounts and Grants Receivable

Receivables are stated at the amount management expects to collect. Amounts that management believes to be uncollectible after collection efforts have been completed are written off. In addition, management evaluates the need for, and if appropriate, provides an allowance to reduce receivables to amounts management expects will be collected. Management determines the allowance for uncollectible accounts receivable based on historical information, adjusted for current conditions, and reasonable and supportable forecasts. Management determined that no allowances were necessary at June 30, 2024 and 2023.

Revenue and Revenue Recognition

A portion of the School's revenue is derived from cost-reimbursable federal and state contracts and grants, which are conditioned upon certain performance requirements and/or the incurrence of allowable qualifying expenses. Amounts received are recognized as revenue when the School has incurred expenditures in compliance with specific contract or grant provisions. Amounts received prior to incurring qualifying expenditures are reported as refundable advances in the statement of financial position. The School was awarded cost-reimbursable grants of \$13,088 and \$3,367,991 that have not been recognized at June 30, 2024 and 2023, respectively, because qualifying expenditures have not yet been incurred, with advance payments of \$5,000 recognized in the statement of financial position as refundable advances at June 30, 2023. There were no refundable advances at June 30, 2024.

Funding sources may, at their discretion, amend the grant and contract amounts. In addition, reimbursement for expenses or return of funds, or both, may be requested as a result of noncompliance by the School with the terms of the grants and contracts. The School records such amendments, reimbursements, and returns of funds as an adjustment to revenue in the year of the amendment.

The School recognizes revenue derived from tuition and food service. Tuition income is recognized during the school year based on enrollment. Food service revenue is recognized when earned at the time of service.

Contributions

The School recognizes contributions when cash, securities or other assets, an unconditional promise to give, or a notification of a beneficial interest is received. Contributions that are expected to be received in future years are recorded at their present value. Conditional promises to give, that is, those with a measurable performance or other barrier and a right of return, are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been met.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost. The School capitalizes property and equipment with an estimated life of 2 or more years and amounts over the following thresholds:

Depreciation and amortization expense amounted to \$2,263,689 and \$2,071,401 for the years ended June 30, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

Functional Expenses

The costs of providing the various program services have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of functional expenses. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among program, and management and general categories. An immaterial amount of fundraising costs for the years ended June 30, 2024 and 2023 are included in management and general expenses.

The financial statements report certain categories of expenses that are attributed to both program, and management and general functions. Therefore, allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied is required. The expenses that are allocated include occupancy, repairs and maintenance, insurance and depreciation, which are allocated on a square footage basis, as well as salaries and wages, benefits, payroll taxes, other purchased services, student services, supplies, office expenses, and other expenses, which are allocated on the basis of estimates of time and effort for each category.

Advertising

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred.

Determining Fair Value of Financial Assets and Liabilities

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America established a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

- Level 1: Inputs to the valuation method are unadjusted quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.
- Level 2: Inputs to the valuation method include:
 - quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
 - quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets:
 - inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
 - inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlate correlation or by other means.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation method are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used, need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Comparative Financial Information

The financial statements include certain prior year summarized comparative information in total. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the School's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2023 from which the summarized information was derived.

Income Taxes

The Internal Revenue Service has determined that the School is qualified as a charity exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. As a result, no provision for federal or state income taxes has been made.

Use of Estimates in the Preparation of Financial Statements

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts of assets and liabilities, revenues and expenses, and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could vary from those estimates.

Recent Accounting Pronouncements

In February 2016, FASB issued ASU 2016-02, *Leases (Topic 842)*. ASU 2016-02 requires the recognition of lease assets and lease liabilities by lessees for those leases currently classified as operating leases and makes certain changes to the accounting for lease expenses. The main difference between the guidance in ASU 2016-02 and current GAAP is the recognition of lease assets and lease liabilities by lessees for those leases classified as operating leases under current GAAP. During the year ended June 30, 2023 the School adopted ASU 2016-02 for its leasing arrangements, along with the practical expedient, which allows modifications of contracts to be applied at the time of adoption. As a result of implementing ASU No. 2016-02, the School recognized right-of-use assets and lease liabilities totaling \$13,835,372 in its statements of financial position as of July 1, 2022.

On July 1, 2023, the School adopted ASU 2016-13 Financial Instruments — Credit Losses (Topic 326): Measurement of Credit Losses on Financial Instruments (ASC 326). This standard replaced the incurred loss methodology with an expected loss methodology that is referred to as the current expected credit loss (CECL) methodology. CECL requires an estimate of credit losses for the remaining estimated life of the financial asset using historical experience, current conditions, and reasonable and supportable forecasts and generally applies to financial assets measured at amortized cost, including loan receivables. Financial assets measured at amortized cost will be presented at the net amount expected to be collected by using an allowance for credit losses. The School adopted ASC 326 and all related subsequent amendments thereto effective July 1, 2023 using the modified retrospective transition approach for all financial assets. Accordingly, financial information for periods prior to the date of initial application has not been adjusted. This required recognition had no current impact to the School's financial statements.

June 30, 2024 (Continued)

NOTE 2 - LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY

The School regularly monitors the availability of resources required to meet its operating needs and other contractual commitments. For purposes of analyzing resources available to meet general expenditures over a 12-month period, the School considers all expenditures related to its ongoing activities, as well as the conduct of services undertaken to support those activities to be general expenditures.

The School also receives basic charter school tuition and grants throughout the year to provide additional funds for general expenditures.

NOTE 3 - CASH, CASH EQUIVALENTS, AND RESTRICTED CASH

For purposes of the statements of cash flows, cash, cash equivalents, and restricted cash include all cash on hand and in banks, which at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The School considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents. Certain of these accounts are not federally insured, however, the School does have a collateral agreement with their bank that provides a possible avenue of recovery in the unlikely event of a bank failure. The School has not experienced any losses in these accounts and does not believe it is exposed to any significant credit risk with respect to cash, cash equivalents, and restricted cash.

The School maintains cash in an escrow account in accordance with the terms of their charter agreement. The escrow is restricted to fund legal and other costs related to the dissolution of the School. The School also maintains funds on behalf of the students. The amounts collected are reported as a liability on the statement of financial position.

NOTE 4 - INVESTMENTS

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair market value. Unrealized gains or losses on securities result from differences between the cost and fair market value of securities on a specified valuation date.

Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, economic conditions, world affairs and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying financial statements.

Investments are held in investment funds managed by professional investment advisors. A summary of investments at market value at June 30 are as follows:

NOTE 5 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The School leases schools and office space from Terra Science and Education, Inc. ("Terra"). Terra and the School share one common board member. This board member abstains from voting matters affecting both the School and Terra and is not paid a salary from the School. Total rent expense paid to Terra for the years ended June 30, 2024 and 2023 was \$2,445,143 and \$2,394,901, respectively. Terra also holds \$288,522 of security deposits due to the School at the termination of the building leases as of June 30, 2024 and 2023.

During the year ended June 30, 2020, the School entered into a memorandum of understanding with Terra to provide funding for leasehold improvements totaling \$200,000. This amount is considered prepaid rent for 60 months. During the years ended June 30, 2023 and 2022, the School entered into additional memorandums of understanding with Terra to provide funding for leasehold improvements totaling \$80,000 and \$130,000, respectively. These amounts are considered prepaid rent for 36 months. The School has reduced the operating lease liability by the prepaid amounts and is recognizing monthly rent expense over these time periods. For the years ended June 30, 2024 and 2023, the balance of prepaid rent left to recognize was \$176,667 and \$286,667, respectively.

NOTE 6 - PENSION EXPENSE

The School participates in the New York State Teachers' Retirement System (System), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer, defined benefit pension plan administered by the New York State Teachers' Retirement Board. The System provides retirement, disability, withdrawal, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries as authorized by the Education Law and the Retirement and Social Security Law of the State of New York.

Plan members who joined the System before July 27, 1976 are not required to make contributions. Those joining after that date and before January 1, 2010, who have less than ten years of service or membership are required to contribute 3% of their annual salary. Those joining on or after January 1, 2010 and before April 1, 2012 are required to contribute 3.5% of their annual salary for their entire working career. Those joining on or after April 1, 2012 are required to contribute between 3% and 6%, dependent upon their salary, for their entire working career.

June 30, 2024 (Continued)

NOTE 6 - PENSION EXPENSE (Continued)

Employers are required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The rate applicable to the fiscal years ended June 30, 2024 and 2023 was 9.76% and 10.29%, respectively. The total retirement contribution expense for the System was \$1,648,301 and \$1,686,534 for the years ended June 30, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

The School also has a 403(b) annuity retirement plan for its employees. Employees that are not eligible for the New York State Teachers' Retirement System, and who work more than 20 hours per week, are made eligible immediately upon employment and may contribute a portion of their taxable salary not to exceed the statutory limits each year. Eligible employees may also receive discretionary amounts the School contributes. The School matches contributions up to \$200 per month and \$2,000 per year. The total 403(b) contribution expense was \$88,610 and \$60,749 for the years ended June 30, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

NOTE 7 - LEASES

The School determines if an arrangement is or contains a lease at inception. Leases are included in right-of-use (ROU) assets and lease liabilities in the statements of financial position. ROU assets and lease liabilities reflect the present value of the future minimum lease payments over the lease term, and ROU assets also include prepaid or accrued rent. Operating lease expense is recognized on a straight-line basis over the lease term. The School does not report ROU assets and leases liabilities for its immaterial or short-term leases (leases with a term of 12 months or less). Instead, the lease payments of those leases are reported as lease expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

The School evaluated current contracts to determine which met the criteria of a lease. The ROU assets represent the School's right to use underlying assets for the lease term, and the lease liabilities represent the School's obligation to make lease payments arising from these leases. The ROU assets and lease liabilities, all of which arise from operating leases, were calculated based on the present value of future lease payments over the lease terms. The School has made an accounting policy election to use a risk-free rate in lieu of its incremental borrowing rate to discount future lease payments.

The School is obligated under operating leases for eight buildings. The leases can be terminated with a ten month notice. For each lease, the School is responsible for payment of utilities, maintenance, and real property taxes.

The first lease term ends June 30, 2026. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$44,423 with an escalation clause equal to the greater of 4% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States.

The second lease term ends June 30, 2026. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$30,109 with an escalation clause equal to the greater of 4% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States beginning in fiscal year June 30, 2024.

The third lease term ends June 30, 2029. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$23,918 with an escalation clause equal to the greater of 4% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States.

The fourth lease term ends June 30, 2032. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$28,187 with an escalation clause to an amount equal to the greater of 4% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States.

The fifth lease term ends January 30, 2060. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$29,338. The lease has an escalation clause equal to the greater of 4% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States. The lease has an option to renew for six additional ten year terms which it is not reasonably certain to exercise. Additionally, there is a level of uncertainty that they will remain in the building beyond ten years and may exercise their right to cancel with ten months notice. Therefore, the payments beyond the first ten years of the lease and those associated with the extensions are not included in the ROU asset and the lease liability recognized as of June 30, 2024 and 2023.

The sixth lease term ends July 31, 2027. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$30,563. The lease has an escalation clause equal to the greater of 2.5% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States. The lease has an option to renew two additional five year terms which it is not reasonably certain to exercise. Therefore, the payments associated with these extensions are not included in the ROU asset and the lease liability recognized as of June 30, 2024 and 2023.

The seventh lease term ends June 30, 2027. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$8,373. The lease has an escalation clause equal to the greater of 2.5% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States. The lease has an option to renew two additional five year terms which it is not reasonably certain to exercise. Therefore, the payments associated with these extensions are not included in the ROU asset and the lease liability recognized as of June 30, 2024 and 2023.

The eighth lease term ended June 30, 2024. Rent was payable in monthly installments of \$7,156. This lease was renewed after year end beginning July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2029. The lease has an escalation clause equal to the greater of 2%. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$7,300. Due to the lease not being in effect until July 1, 2024, the payments associated with this extension are not included in the ROU asset and the lease liability recognized as of June 30, 2024.

The School is also obligated under operating leases for seven copiers. Three copier leases are through June 30, 2028, and four leases are through June 30, 2027.

NOTE 9 - DONATED SERVICES AND GOODS

The School receives donated services that, although substantial, do not meet the criteria for recording as revenue and expense under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. During the years ended June 30, 2024 and 2023, 11 and 7 active volunteers provided approximately 815 and 730 hours of service, respectively.

The School receives food commodities from the U.S. Department of Agriculture for use in the Food Services Program. During the years ended June 30, 2024 and 2023, the School received in-kind food donations of \$122,153 and \$108,893, respectively. The value of this donation is based on original cost provided by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

The School's policy related to gifts-in-kind is to utilize the assets given to carry out the mission of the School. If an asset is provided that does not allow the School to utilize it in its normal course of business, the asset will be sold at its fair market value as determined by an appraisal or by a specialist depending on the type of asset.

NOTE 10 - SPECIAL EDUCATION AND OTHER SUPPORT

Some of the special education services required by students of the School are provided by the Syracuse, Utica, and Rochester City School Districts. The Syracuse, Utica, and Rochester City School Districts also provided transportation and nursing services. The School was unable to determine a value for these services, thus, these financial statements do not reflect revenue or expenses associated with those services.

The School receives State Aid in the form of textbooks, computer hardware, computer software, and library materials through the Syracuse, Utica, and Rochester City School Districts. The total aid received for the years ended June 30, 2024 and 2023 was \$214,649 and \$94,712, respectively. The value of this aid is provided by the City School Districts and is based on original cost.

NOTE 11 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent events have been evaluated through October 28, 2024, which is the date the statements were available for issuance.

Note 1 - Basis of Presentation:

The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (the "Schedule") includes the federal award activity of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools under programs of the federal government for the year ended June 30, 2024. The information in this Schedule is presented in accordance with the requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* (Uniform Guidance). Because the Schedule presents only a selected portion of the operations of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools, it is not intended to and does not present the financial position, change in net assets or cash flows of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

Expenditures reported on the Schedule are reported on the accrual basis of accounting. Such expenditures are recognized following the cost principles contained in the Uniform Guidance, wherein certain types of expenditures are not allowable or are limited as to reimbursement. Science Academies of New York Charter Schools has not yet elected not to use the 10% de minimis indirect cost rate allowed under the Uniform Guidance.

In addition to the required communications that we included in a separate letter, we have some observations about financial trends and recommendations for improvements.

Trends

Comparative financial information and trends for the current and prior three years are also enclosed. This information should assist you in analyzing your financial results, and may be useful for budgeting and planning. Significant trends that we noted include:

- The School had net income of \$9.8 million this year, up from \$6.9 million in 2023. A portion of the income was used to purchase new certificates of deposit totaling almost \$4.5 million. The balance is in the cash accounts. Cash increased by almost \$6.8 million this year.
- Accounts receivable increased approximately \$400,000 from the prior year. While accounts receivable can vary based on the timing of payments, there were large receivables from the Syracuse City School District for IDEA funds and from the North Syracuse Central School District for tuition payments that were higher at the end of the year than in the past. Alternately, grants receivable decreased \$1.6 million from the prior year due to the Cares Act grants winding down.
- Tuition and special education revenue increased due to adding grade levels to Citizenship and Science Academy of Syracuse and Citizenship and Science Academy of Rochester as well as the number of students served being expanded at Utica and Citizenship in Syracuse. There was an increase of of over \$5.1 million this year. There was a related increase in total personnel services expense of \$3,685,000.
- There was an Employee Retention Credit received this year of \$1.6 million up from the one that was received in the prior year of \$477,000. This helped increase the excess this year.

We have audited the financial statements of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools for the year ended June 30, 2024. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards, *Government Auditing Standards* and the *Uniform Guidance*, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our Audit Plan provided to you prior to the engagement. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

General Observations and Significant Audit Matters

- Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by Science Academies of New York Charter Schools are described in Note 1 to the financial statements. As described in Note 1, the School changed accounting policies related to credit losses by adopting FASB Accounting Standards Update 2016-13, Financial Instruments Credit Losses (Topic 326): Measurement of Credit Losses on Financial Instruments (ASC 326) during the year. We noted no transactions entered into by the School during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.
- Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. The most sensitive estimates affecting the financial statements include areas such as functional allocation of expenses and inkind valuation.

- The *financial statement disclosures* are neutral, consistent, and clear. Certain financial statement disclosures are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. The most sensitive disclosures affecting the financial statements include the disclosures of Investments in Note 4, Related Party Transactions in Note 5, and Leases in Note 7 to the financial statements.
- Management may disagree with auditors about areas needed to be accessed for audits or about
 conclusions that are reached with respect to amounts or disclosures. Management may explain
 their position and may also reach out to other CPAs or experts. We did not have any such
 disagreements or difficulties with management.
- Whenever we become aware of *adjustments or corrections* that are not clearly trivial, we will discuss them with management. Management approved all accounting adjustments that were proposed and recorded to make your financial statements materially correct.
- We have requested certain *representations from management* that are included in the management representation letter.
